A YEAR OF EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL

The Introductory Rites of Mass

Last Sunday we looked at the Entrance Procession. This procession ends at the altar where all bow, and both the priest and deacon kiss the altar as a sign of respect for the sacred sacrifice that will take place there.

The Sign of the Cross: After the procession, the priest goes to the presider's chair. When the music ends, the priest makes the Sign of the Cross on himself, as the assembly follows. The reason he does this is because the entire Mass is a prayer, and as Catholics, we usually begin prayers by reminding ourselves in whose name we are praying.

Afterwards he greets the people by saying a variation of "*the Lord be with you.*" This is an ancient greeting found throughout the Old Testament, and we respond with "*and with your spirit.*"

Penitential Rites: Then the priest invites us to call to mind our sins and to ask for God's pardon, so as to prepare ourselves to take part in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. At this point the priest has a little leeway in how he chooses to proceed. He can either lead the people in the recitation of the Confiteor (*I confess to almighty God...*) or he can go straight to the Kyrie Eleison (*Lord have mercy*).

Whichever one he chooses is followed by him granting absolution to the people. It must be noted though, that the absolution granted by the priest during the penitential rite does not bring about efficacious absolution. It is a common misconception that the *Confiteor* or *Kyrie Eleison* cleanses us from mortal sins, thus making sacramental Confession nothing more than redundancy. This is not so. If you are not in a state of grace, by knowingly committing a sin of grave matter (also known as a mortal sin) then you still may not receive communion even after the penitential rite. This is then followed by the "Gloria" and then the "Collect." Next Sunday we will look at the importance of the Gloria and the Collect.

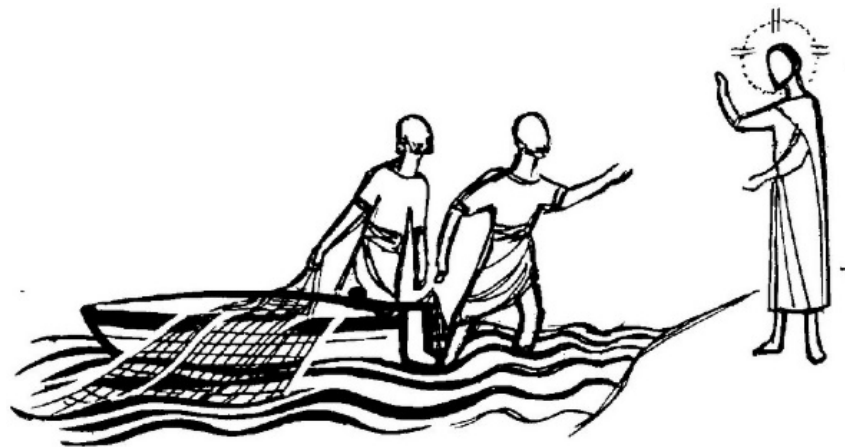

The Year of Parish Revival

The Introductory Rite and the Liturgy of the Word

- When we walk through the church doors we first bless ourselves with the sign of the cross, connecting us with the greater community of all Catholics, both around the world and those living and deceased.
- The service begins as the Priest, ministers and servers enter and process down the center aisle toward the sanctuary. The servers lead with a cross. A deacon carries the Book of the Gospels, which he will place on the altar. We stand to praise God in song.
- When they reach the sanctuary, they bow before the table of God, in reverence to the presence of God among us. The Priest and deacons then approach the altar and kiss it, in reverence of the sacrifice Christ paid for our salvation.
- The Priest begins saying: "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit" and makes the sign of the cross. This gesture identifies us as a baptized people, redeemed by Christ.
- The Priest greets us with "The Lord be with you." proclaiming the Lord's presence among us. This greeting is a shortened version of the greeting given by Paul: "The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all." We respond, "And with your spirit," also acknowledging Christ's presence.
- We are then asked to call to mind our sins and ask God for mercy, repeating "Lord have mercy" three times. We take part in this Act of Penitence, not out of guilt, but out of the loving mercy of the Lord.
- All sing (or say) "The Gloria" a hymn of praise; a very ancient and venerable hymn. The *Gloria* begins by echoing the proclamation of the angels at the birth of Christ: "Glory to God in the highest!" The Priest says the opening prayer, which concludes the Introductory Rite of the Mass.
- We are now asked to sit and listen to three readings from the holy Bible. The Liturgy of the Word is comprised of three scripture readings, a homily, the profession of faith, and the prayers of the faithful.
- The first reading is mostly chosen from the Old Testament. It usually complements the Gospel reading by revealing the continuity between Israel and Jesus who comes not to replace but to fulfill. Afterwards we recite or sing a Psalm as a prayerful response to what we have heard.
- The second reading, usually from the New Testament, focusses on situations in the early Church that transcends the centuries to influence us today.
- We then stand and sing the **Alleluia**, which announces the Gospel reading. "Alleluia," is a Latin echo of the Hebrew acclamation "Praise God!" The church deacon (or the priest) goes to the altar, lifts the Gospel book and processes with the book held high.
- We remain standing during the Gospel reading to witness Christ's resurrection" and trace **the sign of the cross** on the forehead, the lips and over the heart, to remind us to keep "Christ in our thoughts," Christ in what we say" and "Christ in our hearts".
- We sit to listen to the *homily*, which is different than a sermon in that it's an explanation and reflection on the Word of God showing us how the word of God addresses us today.
- We stand to recite the ancient prayer of faith, the Nicene Creed, which sums up all the teaching of the Church and what we believe as Christians.
- The minister then reads our petitions to God for the needs of the Church, society, the parish, people in need, the sick and suffering, and those who have died. We are asked to add any petitions in our heart, which concludes this part of the Mass.
