


DEAR PARISH FAMILY,

Whether we like it or not, one of the most important elements that makes the world revolve is human 'authority.' It can either be used well, to build, or abused, to destroy. In our spiritual journey too, the issue of healthy religious authority is extraordinarily important and complex for believers, for it fosters and forms our religious integrity. In both the Old Testament and the Gospel text today, it is the focus of the audience's attention. The Gospel finds Jesus teaching in the synagogue in Capernaum. The people were surprised that he taught with such authority. They were amazed when he confronted and cast out an evil spirit from a man who was among them. The evil spirit called Jesus "the Holy One of God." Those who witnessed this power and authority spread word of Jesus throughout Galilee.

By virtue of baptism, we each have received this power and authority. Since it is the same power and authority that raised Jesus Christ from death, it must continue to live in us as well. *Perhaps today's Gospel invites us to consider how we use power and authority as parents, as bosses or supervisors, as coaches, as captain of the team or class president.* Do we use our power and authority for the good of others? Do we use our power and authority to bring about positive change? Do we use our power and authority to guide our children or others in the ways of holiness and righteousness? Our use of power and authority has the potential to lift people up or to tear them down. The words we choose, the tone of voice we use, and the actions we take reveal to our family members, to friends, and to others that it is Jesus Christ who has authority over our lives. Be a good steward in exercising your God-given authority.

Know your Catholic **Faith Corner**



Deuteronomy 18:15-20; 1 Corinthians 7:32-35; Mark 1:21-28.

In the First Reading, Moses mentions a prophet just like him who is to come. But just what exactly is a prophet, and what is important for us to know about them? Simply put, a prophet is someone chosen by God to speak for God. Their job, whatever the time period or tidings, was to accurately impart His message. Men and women called to this task came from differing backgrounds, personalities and levels of social status. But what they all had in common was a heart for God, an anointing to hear from Him, and the faithfulness to impart his message to others.

Long time ago, Moses prophesied about a great and final prophet (eschatological prophet) who would come and speak on God's behalf (mediator of God's word). He will speak with Divine authority and "I will put my words into his mouth," says the Lord (Deuteronomy 18:18).

The Gospel: This prophecy is fulfilled in the coming of Jesus. He confirmed this fact in speech, "I have not spoken on my own authority. My Father commanded me what I should say" (John 8:28). Jesus handed over the baton of teaching ministry to his Apostles. The Apostles passed on the responsibility of teaching to their successors, and the unbroken link has reached all of us today.

Ouestions for reflection: In what way are you called to be a prophet? To whom are you being sent to prophesy?

Other references about being a prophet: 1 Kings 16:7; 2 Kings 22:15-17; Jeremiah 1:14-16; Jeremiah 5:14-17; Jeremiah 3:12-13.



I should like you to be free of anxieties.

An unmarried man is anxious about the things of the Lord,

so that she may be holy in both body and spirit.

A married woman, on the other hand,


