CATHOLIC FAITH CORNER

As we saw last Sunday, from July 28 to August 25, the Sunday Gospel has turned to the Bread of Life discourse in John 6. Our bishops are asking every parish in the United States to participate in a kerygmatic preaching series for those five weeks, proclaiming Eucharistic theology from the pulpit in a special unified way. As parishioners and faithful Catholics, it is also important that we find time to have discussions in our small group settings.

We read in Exodus 16:2–3,15 “The whole Israelite community grumbled against Moses and Aaron. The Israelites said to them, ‘Would that we had died at the LORD’s hand...This is the bread that the LORD has given you to eat.’” And in John 6:35, Jesus says: “Whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst.” “Believing is possible only by grace and the interior helps of the Holy Spirit. But it is no less true that believing is an authentically human act.” (CCC 154) God provides for our needs but not always in the way we anticipate. True life is found in Christ, who is available to us in the Eucharist.

REFLECTION QUESTIONS

1. How do I choose to believe when it is difficult to do so?
2. What old ways do I need to put away so that I may find life in Christ?
3. In what ways does the Eucharist feed me?

ABOUT ST. JOHN VIANNEY CHURCH AND SCHOOL

The Roman Catholic Diocese of Honolulu announced in August 1962 the newest parish in the islands, the second one in Kailua.

The new parish was established to serve the newly developed area of Enchanted Lake and the growing Kailua community. The parish was named St. John Vianney after the patron saint of all Catholic priests.

Mr. Joseph Pao pledged to donate the church, in memory of his parents Joe and Mary Pao. The Kailua Heights Joint Venture Company and the Kaelepulu Investment Company donated and developed four choice acres which comprised the parish campus.

The pastor of the new church was Fr. John B. Read, ordained in Kentucky on May 31, 1952, and the assistant pastor was Fr. Patrick Freitas, newly ordained from Maui. A residence for them was built simultaneously with the new church. The church building was completed and dedicated on February 24, 1963, as a modern, functional, 425-seat building of steel and concrete construction. At the end of its first year, the parish rejoiced in 135 Baptisms, 110 First Communicants, 75 Confirmed, 20 Converts, and had grown from 650 to 750 registered families.

Pastors following Fr. John Read were Fr. Patrick Freitas, Fr. Nathan Mamo, Fr. Joseph Grimaldi, Fr. Thomas Gross and Fr. Peter Miti. The present pastor is Fr. Vincent Vu. Presently, the parish has an active congregation of over 600 families. The parish facilities include the Church, remodeled in 2006, the Parish Center with parish and school offices and meeting rooms; a ten room school building; the Fr. John Read Center; a Parish Hall; and the pastor's residence.

In less than three years after established, St. John Vianney parishioners clamored for a school. Plans for a school and convent were submitted by architect Ray Akagi and approved by the Building Commission and the Bishop. The Franciscan Sisters of Manitowoc, Wisconsin agreed to staff the school and the school opened in 1965. At the conclusion of the school year (78-79), after 12 years of rich service to our parish, we bade the sisters farewell. The departure of the Sisters left us with an empty convent. After some renovations, the convent was re-opened as a shared parish and school facility, which was named "The John B. Read Center". Since then more renovations have taken place and the center now consists of early learning centers for 3 and 4 year olds, a contemporary science classroom-lab, an art studio, a 21st century technology center and a modern library. It currently runs on a year round schedule with approximately 210 students.

St. John Vianney parish's success over the years is due to our many dedicated parish organizations. They have helped our parish achieve its mission, which is to provide quality worship, education, ministry and outreach to our parishioners and the community at large, and will guide our parish for future years.

Invite One Back to the Church.

- There are many reasons why Catholics have stopped attending Mass, including a significant number who lost connection with our parish during the pandemic shutdowns, and just never came back.
- There is also a very real pain for grandparents, parents, and children who have witnessed their loved ones who no longer practice the Catholic faith.
- We need to respond to the Holy Spirit's promptings to "Invite Back" those who have been away from the regular practice of the Mass. Let us pray earnestly for the Holy Spirit's guidance and fortitude to carry out this sacred mission.
- Each of us needs to invite back someone who has left the Church in a way that makes them feel seen and desired as a member of our parish family.
- The majority will only come back if personally invited. An invitation is not forceful nor aggressive, yet, by nature, it expects a response.
- It is important to invite these people back because it is a great act of love! It is also one of the simplest and most effective ways to evangelize.
- With the Invite One Back campaign, you are asked to identify a parishioner who hasn't returned to our parish since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic and to invite them back to Mass.
- Just like the Good Shepherd, we will call each of the lost sheep home as a part of the Invite One Back initiative.
- If even one person is missing from our parish, their absence matters! Every person who has ever been a parishioner at our church is a person with an immortal soul and, therefore, an infinite amount of value.
- The Church remains a spiritual home and community of people in need of God's love and mercy.
- May we embrace each soul with open arms, rejoicing as they return to the embrace of the Church and our parish community through the gift of the Eucharist.

Our Parish Faith Formation Committee encourages everyone in our parish family to learn more about this specific topic.
